ST. ANDREW'S HISTORY

The main floor hallway features portraits of all the ministers who have served St. Andrew's and a "Heritage Wall" where changing displays of an historical nature are mounted.


A dumb waiter; raised and lowered by ropes used to carry tea and coffee and refreshments from the kitchen to upper levels of the church, in particular to Grant Hall for teas and other events. It has since been closed off to meet fire safety requirements. The ladies of the church often had to retrieve cutlery from the bottom, of the shaft.

A feature of Grant and upper halls are the glass block windows. The Chapel has its own style of beautiful windows. An upper meeting room, decorated and used by-youth groups features frosted glass sliding windows that at one time moved up and down and provide a view down into the chapel. These too have needed to be nailed in place for safety.

The present church is the second one to stand on this site. The original brick church was built in 1889. When the congregation outgrew it, and the new church planned, the original building was moved over to the south of the lot where the hall now stands. At the time it was used for the Sunday School and other church purposes. When the new hall was built, the original structure was moved again, this time

on rollers all the way to
Pruden Street, where it was
known as Knox
Presbyterian. That building

has served as a place of worship for few different denominations and still stands on Pruden St.

Globally, human trafficking is the third largest organized crime after drugs and the arms trade. Fighting human trafficking is one of the mission priorities of the Caribbean and North America Council for Mission (CANACOM). A fellowship of 14 denominations, CANACOM fosters partnership in mission among churches in the Caribbean and North America through sharing of resources, accompaniment and empowerment. In 2016, ARISE Ministry received a grant from CANACOM for its work in empowering women to break free from human trafficking. ARISE's Executive Director, the Rev. Deb Stanbury, currently serves as the PCC's representative on the council. By participating in the meetings, Deb is our living link with our partner churches and organizations in the Caribbean.
