ST. ANDREW'S HISTORY

Carillonic Bells

The original carillon was installed in memory of those who gave their lives in the two World Wars. This Carillon operated with rolls, like a player piano. When repair parts were no longer available for the original carillon system, a second Carillonic Bell system was installed.

In the summer of 1996, again in memory of those who fell during the First and Second World Wars. The funding for this installation was raised by a special appeal to the members of St. Andrew's congregation and the members of the several Royal Canadian Legions in the south ward of the city together with the Army and Navy Veteran's Association. This second bell system utilized small diskettes for the various chimes. When this system was dedicated representatives from the organizations who participated in the fundraising were also present for the formal Dedication Service.

In 2017 this second carillon became antiquated, but with the advances in technology an inexpensive laptop computer program was put into place. Just as has always been the case, the bells ring out for Sunday morning call to worship; sound the Westminster Chimes on the hour, quarter hours, and half hour. Public musical chimes ring out during the noon hour, at 5:00 o'clock and early evening and can be heard across the central business district.

Sanctuary

The sanctuary is entered through two heavy oak doors.

The interior features hand carved, weathered oak furnishings, with carving on the ends of the pews, the front of the raised pulpit and choir loft. The U-shaped gallery has matching quarter-cut oak tracery panelling. The interior furnishings were supplied by the Valley City Seating Co., of Dundas, Ontario. Including the gallery, the church can seat about 600 people.

The lighting fixtures are of brushed brass. Three large chandeliers hang from the lofty ceiling. The centre bulb of each is 1500 watts. Each centre bulb is lighting surrounded by eight LED bulbs. To change the light bulbs, these chandeliers were originally lowered by hand from above. Now there is a' winch to do it.

On the walls are brackets with mainly two lights each Under the gallery, there are ceiling lights. Lanterns of Gothic design light the vestibules.

Two items of interest are the Book of Remembrance with the names of those associated with the congregation who gave their lives for our country in the First and Second World Wars. This can be found in a glass-topped carved case on the South wall of the sanctuary. Also to be noted is a handcrafted cabinet carved by George Murie. He presented it to the church in the early 1950's.

When the war in Syria intensified in 2012, many families were driven from their homes. The bombing of Garib's family apartment left him clutching his two-day old son as they ran "a race for their lives." Garib's family misses the things that made Syria home: "My four-year-old remembers that he used to have a bicycle back in Syria. That's not an option for him here."
