We read from two scriptures today. The first is from a letter written by the Apostle Paul to a faith community in Corinth, the second reading from the Gospel of Matthew. Both readings come from the end of their respective writings. (Please note: in the video I say the reader is Sandra Dewsberry, when it was Mairi Gerow!)

Scripture Readings

✤ 2 Corinthians 13:11-13

¹¹Finally, brothers and sisters, farewell. Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. ¹²Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the saints greet you. ¹³The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you.

✤ Matthew 28:16-20

¹⁶Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them. ¹⁷When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted. ¹⁸And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. ¹⁹Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, ²⁰and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Message

Ready. Set. Go! As a child, how many times have you heard those words at the start of a race. The Olympics were set for this summer we had hoped to hear "Ready, Set, Go!" over and over, although the word "go" has been replaced by the sound of a starting pistol. It still means "Go!"

In the gospel reading from Matthew we hear, "Go. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you." (vv19-20) Go. Just get out there.

Jesus didn't say make sure you know exactly how you are going to tell people about God or how you might do things. Just go. Attending church whether in person or online, listening to a sermon, reading your Bible, and praying are all preparation for going out. We need to study what we want to understand and share, but then go. Go and spend time with others, learn about them. Get involved. Show that you care and that God cares. Let your faith be evident in your conversation, your actions, your life. In fact, it should inspire your conversation, actions, and your life. But for goodness sake don't keep it to yourself. How can anyone ever know what it means to have faith in God if no one ever tells them about it?

I get that God is a mystery. Don't worry about it. Do what you can do. Share what you can share in any given moment and trust God to work with it. We sow seeds. It is not our responsibility to make sure the seed grows. We plant hope, love, forgiveness, faith, and let God work with that. Many times, we are given opportunity to build relationships that can help to foster faith and continue to demonstrate through word and deed what it means to be a Christian.

If ever there was a moment in time that we can build relationships it is right now. There is so much to learn about other people from different faiths, ethnicities, and backgrounds. With all its sadness and strife, now is a time where we can reach out and ask questions, get to know others, and share a little of who we are and how our own faith makes a difference for us. The purpose is not to overshadow what is going on in the world. If there is one thing we know about God, it is that God is with those who are struggling and oppressed.

If you want to see God in action pay attention right now. God is walking with those in the protests. God hears their cries for justice and change. As Christians, these are things we can support and even more so, be a part of the change. It often starts with a conversation, building relationships, listening to another's stories so that we can first of all look for what God is up to and second so that we can support the necessary change.

I am sitting in my kitchen today rather than at the church because some of the most important conversations I have, have taken place at my kitchen table. There is something about tables with a cup of coffee, tea, or whatever, that allows for relationship building. It is why family meals are so important. We often learn more about our children, grandchildren, and friends at a table than we do anywhere else. The table allows time and space to learn about one another.

It may be that this is the easiest way for us to build relationship, by inviting someone to our home to share in a meal, or making sure to set a date if someone invites you to meet with them. Rather than just saying, "We should meet for coffee sometime," don't let the moment pass. Set a date. Make an opportunity to learn about another person, their joys, sorrows, faith, and experience. If they ask about you, don't hesitate to share about your faith and how that influences your world view.

It is not that every conversation needs to be deep. More often than not, that will take time to build trust into the relationship. But there is no reason to hide that you are a Christian,

and why that is important to you with a sentence or two when asked about your activities and life. Remember we are sowing seeds, seeds of love and compassion, faith and hope.

I know we struggle with the mystery of God. Even today with this thing we call Trinity Sunday where we name that God is three in one. God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It is okay not to be able to explain everything away, even when critics may want to pressure you into doing so. I say again, as I as I have so often, if God fits neatly into some explainable box with no mystery, then that god is not nearly big enough.

We continue to learn about God through the scriptures, being together in community, whether in person or online. We do our best to learn more about God and lean into our faith. That responsibility never goes away, but know that in this lifetime, you will never fully grasp the infinite nature of God. It doesn't mean that you don't know enough to share with others.

I am not a chef or baker, but I have taught my children to cook and bake. I am not a mechanic, but I can drive a car. I am not a computer programmer or technician, but I still use the technology to do my work. We don't need to know everything about something to have it influence, guide, and inform our lives. And we share what we know of things with others, so why not our faith, our understanding of God.

As I write these things, the events of the last couple of weeks are never far from my mind and I wonder where is God when the world suffers. One thing I know is that God is not sitting in our empty churches waiting for our return and watching things unfold in the world. God is out in the neighbourhood, on the streets, at the kitchen table, present, willing and waiting to use everything, every moment, to make this world a more just, hope-filled, and loving place.

God did not will George Floyd's death, in fact I am sure that God was laying on the ground with George holding him in his last breaths, in the cry for his mother. I am also sure that God is out in the neighbourhood using that moment to change us, to change the world. God was with Breonna Taylor, the front-line worker who was shot to death in her apartment when police barged in looking for someone else. God is in the world, and commands us to go! Go! Be with those who are suffering and afraid. Go! Invite people to a table, your table or a coffee shop table, so that you might learn, but that you might also share.

Go! So that God's love might have the last word. Go, not as one who has the answers, but as one who listens. Go, trusting that the Holy Spirit is working through you, breathes life, love, and hope into every corner of the world that you touch. As Christians we have something to offer in this critical moment. We have the love of God who cares so much for those who suffer most. Please don't let another opportunity pass. And remember, God is with you always, to the end of the age.

God is not with us only in the easy moments, the joy filled moments, but also and maybe even more so, in the difficult, dirty, horrific, and change making moments. God is with you always, in every moment. So seize the day as they say, but seize it knowing that God goes with you, and that you belong to a community of faith that will help you through the tough spots, walk with you, guide, and love you, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. One God, the source of all life. Amen.

We respond to all we have heard and sung thus far with a prayer. Let us pray.

Closing Prayer

God of our past and our future, God of healing and hope, We come before you with grateful hearts,

trusting that you walk with us through all the times of our lives,

including this strange time of illness and isolation.

You are still the God of our history and God of the world you love,

so hear us as we pray for your world and the people around us.

We remember today those who face danger and despair in these times: Those who suffer the effects of coronavirus in their lives and in the lives of loved ones; those living with hunger while the world is distracted, those caught up in unrest and violence despite the pandemic, and all whose lives are directed by forces beyond their control.

We pray for all those working to relieve suffering of many different kinds and bring justice and peace to those most vulnerable.

We pray for all those facing fear or frustration, and those wrestling with sorrow or discouragement. We remember those who live with illness, disability or pain day by day, and all who know the grief and change of bereavement.

We pray for all those who work to bring healing and comfort to those who suffer, remembering those who put their own health and life at risk during the pandemic.

We pray for all who feel helpless or hopeless in this present time of such uncertainty: For those facing unemployment or struggling to make ends meet, For those caught up in misunderstanding or broken relationships And for those working through situations of conflict at home or at work.

We pray for all who offer guidance and support in the midst of such difficulties.

God of our past and our future, God of healing and hope,

the General Assembly was supposed to gather today in Waterloo, Ontario, yet our church has had to respond to the pandemic,

cancelling large gatherings and holding others through technological means. Hold us together in the days ahead and remind us of our common faith in Christ. Help us learn from the challenges we are going through and give us new ways of living out our faith.

Support our denomination and our local churches to engage questions and choices with respect and faithfulness, trusting that you can do new things for us and with us. Keep us loving and gracious, in the example of Jesus, our Lord and friend, who pray taught us to pray together:
