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Scripture Reading Romans 8:26-39

²⁶Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. ²⁷And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. ²⁸We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. ²⁹For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. ³⁰And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified.

³¹What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? ³²He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? ³³Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. ³⁴Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. ³⁵Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ³⁶As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered."

³⁷No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

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The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Message God reflecting human beings.

What would it take for you to know how deeply God loves you?

In a world where people are discarded, divorce a common occurrence and broken homes the by-product, abuse of all kinds rampant in companies, organizations, systems, and homes, where families live in poverty, and shame is a common experience, sex has been used as a way to dominate, and people are just plain tired, for many it can be hard to comprehend a divine pure love that will go to any length to bring you into right relationship with that love, with yourself and with others. And yet, that is the love that is at the heart of the gospels and also at the heart of the letter to the Romans.

Paul, the letter writer, cannot express strongly enough what lengths God has gone to in order that we might experience a new creation in our lives and that of others, a creation in which we become as N.T. Wright puts it, "fully functioning, God reflecting human beings."

So, what does it mean to be a fully functioning, God reflecting human being? That is what Paul has been writing about throughout this letter as he shares what Christ has done for us in his life, death, and resurrection. When we find our lives are so closely tied to Christ's dying to sin, and rising to life that we become who God has always known us to be, that is when we begin to see the new creation unfolding in ourselves and others. As has been said before this is a process of becoming, of transformation that continues over a life time.

The passage that we heard read today is assurance that we are not alone in this. Paul writes, "...the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God." (Romans 8:26,27 NRSV)

These words have brought comfort to so many who have found themselves in situations in which they had no words to say or pray. The anguish so deep, the hopelessness so dark that uttering any words was too much. Yet they could trust that the Holy Spirit would intercede on their behalf with sighs, to deep for words, to match what was going on inside them. This personal knowledge of God's love is so important, but there is more to this

passage as well. This passage is about God searching the heart, the place of love, and also knowing the mind of the Spirit, and prayers being offered according to the will of God.

That's what's often missed, the fact that God answers prayer in a way that is in accordance with God's will, which does not always fall in line with our wants and desires. God's answered prayers will have the whole of creation and the people in our lives in mind. Which is why people often misread the next line of scripture. They read it with their wants and desires in mind, rather than trusting the God of love. Paul writes more, "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." So often I have heard this quoted as, "We know God works together for the good of those who love him." People use this verse and hope that God will grant them their desires, but those last words and more to follow indicate that there is more going on than we may be considering.

We have to be aware that we do not know or understand God's purposes, and if we are predestined to be conformed to the image of Jesus, as Paul writes, we have to remember that part of that image is of suffering. As was shared in last week's message the whole creation is groaning as we are transformed into the people God calls us to be and knows we can be.

A note on predestination. It is not that God has predetermined all things in our lives, so it doesn't matter what choices we make. That is an incorrect reading of those words. What has been predetermined or predestined is that God will redeem people and all creation and God has firmly set that goal.

We are predestined and called to be a large family, a family where Jesus was the firstborn, and in this family, as it is being transformed through love and service, grace and forgiveness, we find ourselves living in ways that are life giving. Our desires, our wants, and our needs, conform to the will of God.

It is important then to understand that God's will is love, wholeness, restoration, and transformation. This is where all the experiences we have had with human love, that so often disappoints, must be set aside for the example of Christ who fully shows us in his living and dying how much God loves us – loves you – love the world. We have to let go of our preconceived and even broken experience of love and see that God loves us so much that he became one of us in Jesus Christ in order to know the struggle and pain of living, and begin the process of reconciling the world to himself in a whole new way.

The questions Paul poses are set against this backdrop of love. It is the same love that Paul talks about in his letter to the Ephesians where he says, "I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

So the questions are...

What then are we to say about these things?

If God is for us, who is against us?

He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else?

Who will bring any charge against God's elect?

Who is to condemn?

Who will separate us from the love of Christ?

Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?

The answers are a firm and emphatic, no one and nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Death, life, angels, rulers, things present, things to come, power, height, depth or anything else in all creation will not be able to separate us from the love of God.

Think about that for a moment. Regardless of what you know of love, you have never experienced a love that is this determined to love you, not for their own benefit, but for yours, so that you can have life and life abundant.

Personally, I do not have the capacity to understand that kind of love, a love that is so outpouring, so determined, so amazing, that it will not let me go...but, because of Jesus, and the knowledge that God loves me and every living being, all of creation... I can trust it.

Maybe that is a part of what faith is...the ability to trust God's love so much that you know God will not ever abandon you or those you love. God will not abandon anyone regardless of choices. Even if it appears that everything has gone wrong, God, through Christ, and in the power of the Holy Spirit has not left you or anyone for that matter. God's greatest desire is for us to become fully functioning, God reflecting human beings. It is a life time process, not all of us find our way, but God is always there, reminding us that we are loved and that our purpose is to show mercy and compassion to others as they discover God's love. May we all find ways to be God reflecting human beings in big and small ways, each and everyday. Amen.
