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## Scripture Reading Matthew 20:1-16

'For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard. <sup>2</sup>After agreeing with the labourers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the market-place; <sup>4</sup>and he said to them, "You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right." So they went. 5When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. 6And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, "Why are you standing here idle all day?" <sup>7</sup>They said to him, "Because no one has hired us." He said to them, "You also go into the vineyard." "When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, "Call the labourers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first." 9When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. 10 Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. <sup>11</sup>And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, <sup>12</sup>saying, "These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat." 13But he replied to one of them, "Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? 14Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. <sup>15</sup>Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?" <sup>16</sup>So the last will be first, and the first will be last.'

## Message The Incredible Gift of Grace

Back in 2015 a Credit Card Processing Company in Seattle made the news for giving employees a raise. Dan Price, the CEO of the company decided that he would pay all of his workers a minimum salary of \$70,000 a year after realizing that many of his younger employees were struggling to pay student loans and other obligations. He did this mostly by cutting out his large bonus. The New York Times ran a lengthy article on the many reactions from employees, clients, colleagues and others.<sup>1</sup>

The article reported, "Two of Mr. Price's most valued employees quit, spurred in part by their view that it was unfair to double the pay of some new hires while the longest-serving staff members got small or no raises. Some friends and associates in Seattle's close-knit entrepreneurial network were also piqued that Mr. Price's action made them look stingy in front of their own employees."<sup>2</sup>

There were critics who thought it was just a publicity stunt and others who criticized him for having a socialist agenda. He lost clients, but he also gained clients. No matter what, his commitment caught the attention of many around the globe and everyone had an opinion.

Think about it for yourself. How would you feel if you had been in a job for 10 maybe even 20 years and a new hire was given a wage equal or nearly equal to your own? Ten to one you would think it unfair and be ready to quit in frustration. What kind of thanks is that? There is no scenario where we would think it fair that someone who has given so much to a company, project, or organization should not be rewarded. If a new hire got a living wage, then you would be anxious to see what benefit you would reap from the years of dedication and hard work. Would that not be fair?

Now, you may have a little more understanding of what was going on in that vineyard on the day when the landowner hired some workers first thing in the morning, and then a few more later in the day, and a few more at the end of the day. In fact, he went and hired four more times during the day after the initial agreement with the first labourers. Remember, the people who wanted to be hired were waiting, some waiting all day. They hadn't given up, they hadn't left, they were not lazy, they waited in hope that someone would hire them. Think also of those who are often hired last even today, the elderly, the disabled, those that others deem somehow not valuable, the uneducated.

Anyone in their right mind would expect that the workers who had were hired later in the day would be paid by a sliding scale in comparison to those who had worked the whole day. Those who had worked the shortest amount of time should only be getting a portion of what was considered the usual daily wage. But remember, the landowner only

promised the first labourers that he would pay the usual daily wage, and they were okay with that. As he hired more people, he just said to them "I will pay you whatever is right."

So, when it was time to get paid, the landowner starts with those who had been hired last and worked his way to those who had been hired first. You can almost feel their anticipation. Surely if the others were paid a day's wage then those who had been at work all day would get a larger amount than they had agreed to. A little bonus if you please. But the land owner handed them the agree to amount, the usual daily wage. Everything in us sides with the grumbling labourers who had "borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat". We can't get pass how unfair this seems. What kind of a story is this?!

Well, it is a story, a parable, that demonstrates God's incredible gift of grace. Some call it the scandal of God's divine grace. A professor at Luther Seminary in Minneapolis, Rolf Jacobson says this, "If you understand how much you don't deserve grace and the incredible gift it is, and...you are overwhelmed with gratitude for the grace you are given, that another should also be give it is in defensive. It is the very nature of grace."

The thing about grace is that it cannot be earned. There is nothing you can do to make God give you grace or even more grace than another. Grace is a gift freely and abundantly given by God. It is possible for every human being to receive grace so long as they believe in God and realize just how much they don't deserve it. Because let's face it, not one of us is free from the guilt of having done something to hurt or wrong another human being.

Some might sit on a Sunday morning and think, I am such a good person for having shown up, I live and honest and upright life, but the truth is that those of us in these pews and me up in the pulpit are hopefully here because we recognize how much in need of God's grace we truly are. We are able to be honest with ourselves and trust that the reason we know God's love is because we also accept God's grace. And to accept God's grace is to acknowledge that you don't really deserve it.

Let's expand this a little more. Those who are on the front steps, damaged and homeless, are as important to God as you and I, and God's grace is freely available to them. That is difficult enough, but God's grace is also freely given to the swindler, murderer, liar, cheat. The caveat for all of us is that God's grace should also change us. If you have received God's grace and you realize just how much you don't deserve it, you are changed, even transformed by it. One cannot continue as they are, inflicting harm and doing damage, and say that they believe in God. In receiving this generous gift, we are overwhelmed with gratitude and a desire to become more and more like the person God intended us to be.

Grace is the means by which we can be in relationship with God. Grace is the means by which we heal relationships with others and help others to heal. Grace is the means by

which we are healed, renewed, and transformed. One cannot experience grace and not change. You may stumble, but you will want to do better. Again, it is not that you can earn God's grace, but that in receiving it you are changed.

One might think, well I have been attending church all my life. I have always believed in God. I am deserving of God's grace, surely far more than someone who has never believed or is a new Christian and just learning, or decided on their death bed that rather than take a chance they will believe in God before they go. But this is just not how it works, God's grace is for those who have believed all their lives, for those who are at the end of life, and all those in-between. So, why should you not just wait until you are on your way out to say okay God, I'm yours?

For starters, most of us don't get to choose when we are going to die. Secondly, peace, love, hope, and joy, are all part of the gift of grace, and the longer you live as a Christian who recognizes just how incredible the gift of grace is, the more you will have opportunity to live with peace, love, hope, and joy, in your heart, mind, and body. The person who decides to let God have them just before they die, has missed a lifetime of opportunity to know God and experience grace.

To be known as a child of God is to know love deeper, wider, higher, and longer, than you can imagine. To be a child of God is to have hope even when things are bleak, not because you don't realize the challenges of any given situation, but because you know that you have the strength through Christ to find a way through. To be a child of God who has received the gift of grace is to have peace even when the circumstances appear to be or are chaotic.

I quote Rolf Jacobsen once more, where he writes, grace is "the free gift in which God gives all – eternal life, forgiveness, purpose, meaning – to human beings." This is why there is reason to share the gospel with others. This is why we can give thanks and live a lifetime as productive, joyous, Christians. We have been given eternal life, forgiveness, purpose, and meaning through God's grace.

Going back to the parable, God wants to give all the same gift of grace no matter how underserving they appear, just as the landowner paid everyone the same. It doesn't make sense. It messes with our understanding of fair play and justice. And yet, we receive grace from God on the basis that we are human beings, children of God. In being recipients of that grace may we be gracious to others, not because they deserve it but because they too are precious in God's sight. Accept God's grace today and be changed. Amen.
