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Assurance of Pardon

Friends in Christ, we are forgiven people,

set free from our past failures to make a fresh start this day and every day.

The Holy Spirit empowers us to love God and to love others.

Thanks be to God for such everlasting mercy and grace!

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The scripture reading is set in the day after Jesus had entered Jerusalem and the crowds had welcomed him with palm branches. He has been teaching the people in the temple, all the while being questioned by the temple authorities of elders, scribes Sadducees, and Pharisees, each with their own agenda. Hear now words of scripture from the Gospel of Matthew.

Scripture Reading Matthew 22:34-46

³⁴When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, ³⁵and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. ³⁶"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" ³⁷He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' 38This is the greatest and first commandment. ³⁹And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' 40On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets."

⁴¹Now while the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus asked them this question: ⁴²"What do you think of the Messiah? Whose son is he?" They said to him, "The son of David." ⁴³He said to them, "How is it then that David by the Spirit calls him Lord, saying,

44'The Lord said to my Lord, "Sit at my right hand, until I put your enemies under your feet"?

⁴⁵If David thus calls him Lord, how can he be his son?" ⁴⁶No one was able to give him an answer, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions.

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The word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Reflection Love the Lord your God

It has already been a day of testing. First one group, then another, now another, all of them with authority in the Temple, asking Jesus what they believe are tough questions. He is being guestioned about his authority to teach as he does, he is guestioned about whether or not it is lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, he has had a question about the resurrection of people from a group that doesn't even believe in resurrection from the dead, and now he is being tested on whether or not he has an understanding of which commandment in the law is the greatest.

This last question was not so tough. Every pious Jew had been, since infancy, exposed to and then taught the Shema, words from Deuteronomy 6:5 which say, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might." Actually, Jesus' answer may have caught their attention because he changed up one word. The Shema says, love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and might. Jesus had answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." (Matt 22:37) Just one little word different. Both may be important, but I think it interesting that Jesus said with all your mind instead of might. As was said, it certainly would have caught the attention of all who were listening.

Now, one may think that to love God with all you mind takes doing it with all your might, but was it meant that way? I have posted at my desk, so that I see it every time I look up, the verse from Proverbs 3:5-6 that says, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him and he will make your paths straight." It is a reminder to me that what I think about affect the outcome of everything I do. When I remember to lean on God, and not on my own understanding, my heart, and body follow. There is a reason I have it posted, as it often takes me multiple reminders a day to remember to put God first so that all other things - decisions, actions, words - will follow as best as possible.

It seems such a simple answer to the question of which commandment in the law is the greatest... "You shall Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." How hard can that be? Turns out it is likely one of the most difficult things one can aspire to. Part of the reason the Shema was said daily, why I have a reminder posted, is that it is so easy to forget that which can actually change the way we live. When one loves God with all their heart, soul, and mind, you are giving your whole self to God and since we like to have control over our own lives, even if that is not how life really plays out, to actually give our whole selves to God is a really difficult ask.

God gave us minds so that we could think for ourselves, solve problems, make decisions, question thing we learn, know, and experience. How then can we just turn around and give it all that power back to God? Well, the thing is that we are not asked to give up our inquiring, problem solving, decision making minds. We are asked to use our minds, but to acknowledge at the same time that God is present, available and desires to help us make the best decisions possible, and love God, others, and ourselves in the most purposeful and beautiful ways.

These words remind us that God comes first, before your partner, your children, your friends, your church and community, God comes first. When God is first in our lives...when we give ourselves body, mind, and spirit, to God...then everything we say, hear, and see, every decision and action that we take, the lens through which we see ourselves, our neighbours, and the world, is through our understanding of God.

This is also why it is important to understand that God, first and foremost, is a God of love. Yes, there is judgement, accountability, even discipline, but that is all experienced through God who loved us so much that he sent his son Jesus Christ to experience life with us, to then bring hope, forgiveness, and abundant life. If you do not know God as love then please hear me now, God loves you, God loves those we think are unlovable, God is love.

It is why the second commandment follows from the first, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." (Matt 22:39) The underlying assumption here is that because you know

God's love for you, and thus the fact that you are loved and lovable, you can love others as you love yourself. Please think about what that means in a time when Twitter feeds, Facebook statuses, and Instagram, along with newsfeeds are filled with opinions and misinformation. A time when political leaders, police forces, health care, #black lives matter, the #me too movement, homophobia, Covid, climate change, poverty free living, and refugees, are topics of debate in both the private and public spheres of our lives.

When given the opportunity, how do you speak into these conversations? Is it in a way that loves your neighbor and loves God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind? If you want to understand what it means to love more fully, read the words of scripture, particularly the words of Jesus, paying attention not only to the words, but to his actions. Pay attention to the fact that Jesus spent more time with those who had little - little money, power, or authority - than with those who had much. Pay attention to the fact that Jesus healed those who were hurting, emotionally, spiritually, and physically.

He fed the hungry, healed the broken, and taught about God's love and forgiveness. He cried over death and even over the city of Jerusalem, knowing that they could not see how far removed they were from the will of God for them. He said in Matthew 25, "Come you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for your from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." (Matt 25:34-36)

Pay attention to how you think, what you say, and what you do for through your thoughts, words, and actions, you and others will know if you love God and love neighbour. Do not think that because you cannot do it perfectly that it is not worth doing. We are made in the image of God, but we are not God, which is why we live imperfectly. Still, we can strive and become more and more able to love the Lord our God with all our heart, with all our soul and with all our mind, and love our neighbour as ourselves.

To remember these words, to act upon them daily, is life giving and life changing, for you and for those whose lives you impact because of the lens through which you view the world, the way you experience the world. May God bless your thinking and your living as you become more and more a person who loves God, the other, and yourself. Amen.
