Message Complexity of being known

In 1937 Walt Disney released the first full-length animated movie: *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs.* Producing an animated movie was gargantuan task. Disney artists drew over one million pictures. Each picture flashed onto the screen for a mere one-twenty-fourth of a second.¹ Disney knew the story from conception to its completion. It was his vision, his dream. The story itself came from the 1812 Grimm Brothers collection of fairy tales, but the film, the way the characters were developed, the sound track, each detail was known to Walt. He knew each character, made all the decisions regarding what

scenes would be incorporated and what would end up on the cutting room floor. Everything was known to him.

Is this what it means to be known? A person might say that to be known you have to know the name of the other, maybe their occupation, their family. There are different levels of knowing, or different contexts for knowing someone. It would be a rare occasion for anyone to know everything about another person. The closest one might get is in an intimate loving relationship where the bed is shared in marriage or other civil union. Still, it would be hard to say that anyone could know us so intimately that they would know our every thought and emotion.

Psalm 139 is all about God knowing us. This knowing started from the moment our inward parts were being knit together in our mother's womb (v13). The Psalmist writes that God knows each of us so intimately that "Even before a word is on [our] tongue O Lord you know it completely." (v4)

It would be easy to over preach this particular psalm because the words really speak for themselves. The hope here is to allow you to see just how deeply God is in relationship with you, with everyone. Most of us really don't want anyone to know everything about us. Even the most honest and out there people have parts of themselves that they would prefer to hide, to not be known. It would be threatening to have people know ev-er-y-thing about us. It might feel threatening to think that God knows everything, is acquainted with all our ways. Still remembering and trusting that God intimately knows us...knows everything about us and loves us anyway, can also be a word of comfort. It is a word of hope.

The first and third stanzas of this psalm talk about just how God knows every detail about us, the second stanza talks about how God is present everywhere. There is nowhere we can hide from God's presence, "even the darkness is not dark to God; the night is as bright as the day, for darkness is as light to God. It also means that darkness is nothing to fear because God is there. In the darkness of our most challenging moments God is with us.

Even in the darkness, even when we feel far away from God and others, physically or metaphorically, we can trust that God is present. This presence, this knowing God, is not a threat. Psalm 139 assures us that we are created by God and that means we are valuable. God is present because God loves us, love you. God loves your next door neighbour, your challenging teenager, your mentally ill son our daughter, your mother, your father, the person without a home and food in their belly. God loves each person regardless of faith tradition, sexual orientation, social standing, financial security or insecurity, or ability to move around.

You are known to God. Not only that, you are accompanied by God. God is not there just as some omnipresent being that watches everything you do, but rather is an active presence in our lives. God goes with us, accompanies us in every moment of our lives because God desires to be in relationship with us. God created human beings to be in relationship with each one and everyone.

Because of this love, God will guide those who desire to be in relationship with God. God will sustain those who look to be in relationship with God. It does not mean that life will be easy or filled with good things. It does mean that whatever you face you are conscious of the fact that God goes with you, is guiding you, and sustaining you. Sometimes God does it through prayer, reading, nature, or most often through another person as a wise guide and counselor. The thing is to trust that you are not alone, that God knows you so deeply, so intimately, that you cannot hide your fear, your desires, your hope.

When Walt Disney made *Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs*, he knew every intimate detail of the movie, still he could not be involved in every stroke of the pencil or filming of each frame, he could not play every note in the music, or mix every ounce of paint used.

However, as the psalmist writes, God does know every stitch, every weave, every thought and action or reaction. Be in awe of that, not afraid. Know that this is a sign of hope for every person. God loves you so much that you are never alone, you are awesomely and wonderfully made. Though we don't understand or know God's thoughts, in the end, you are with God and God is with you. You are created, sustained, and loved. Thanks be to God. Amen.

Closing Prayer

God of all life and each life,

Each week our prayers combine with those of people in many different places.

We face many different challenges and also a common challenge,

responding to the pandemic, though in so many different contexts.

We thank you for honouring all our prayers with the gift of your Spirit,

so that we can find strength and wisdom we need in you.

We remember before you today people divided by differences of race or creed, of culture, gender or generation: and we pray for all those who seek to build bridges of understanding and co-operation across differences:

God, speak to us a word of reconciliation:

Embrace us with your love.

We remember before you today your whole creation and its many vulnerable facets and faces. Teach us how to care for the rips and tears in the fabric of the world you love so we may live together wisely:

God, speak to us a word of wisdom:

Embrace us with your love.
