And he was transfigured before them, ³ and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. ⁴And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. ⁵Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." ⁶He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. ⁷Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice,

"This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" ⁸Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus.

⁹As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Message Awe and Wonder

I have never been to the Grand Canyon, but I have seen pictures, I have never scaled a mountain, or sailed the sea, but I have seen a sea of flowers in the Netherlands, colours upon colours, like nature's painting. I have sat by fast moving rivers and watched the power of waterfalls where anything that is caught up in the movement has no choice but to follow the course of the water.

I climbed the small hill near the historic site of Dunvegan that gives a grand view of the Peace River below. I have been on the vast and deep Lake Superior, known for its breath-taking beauty and deadly storms. I have stood in the middle of a forest with trees towering over me, the tops waving at the sky as the wind blows.

And I have be in awe of a dark stormy night sky as lighting lit up long bands of darkness and the clap and crash of the sound of thunder was so strong it rumbled the ground below. Nature has a way of making us pay attention, of standing in awe and wonder, even fear and trembling, as it moves and lives and breathes its power and might.

Recalling moments where you stood in awe and wonder may help to place you in a position to feel and know a little of what the disciples were faced with when they witnessed Jesus "transfigured before them…his clothes…dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them" (Mark 9:3).

Moments of awe and wonder are times to pause, to breath in the experience, to take a moment. It is not a time of analysing. We don't analyze the mountain top, or the flowers, or the water, we just listen, watch, feel, and experience. This moment with Jesus was very much a visual spectacle. We are told that it encompassed two other historical and important figures from Israel's past, Moses and Elijah. We are not told how James and John responded to what they were witnessing other than to say they were terrified, but poor Peter felt he had to do something, rather than be in the moment. Maybe it was the terror, maybe it was because he wanted to hold onto the moment and share it with others. It could be that it fit his picture of glory and power and he didn't want to lose it. But he seems to want to take control of the situation and start a building project to contain what was there before him.

We humans are good at building memorials. Memorials give us a place for remembering. But Jesus wasn't ready to be memorialized. At this time Jesus was still in the middle of his work. Peter, James and John, had been given a gift. This gift was to see Jesus as a fully human being and at the same time fully divine – Holy. They did not understand what they were witnessing in the moment. It was confusing, struck fear into them, and was so unexpected, but experience would stay with them.

Though in the moment Jesus ordered them not to tell any one about what they had seen, he did add the part about, tell no one *until* after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. And that is what we are given in the scripture, the story, the witness, the awe and wonder, even the fear and trembling of the moment after the fact. The disciples recall it in their writing for those who would come after them as witnesses to Jesus' life, death and resurrection, for the purpose of bringing new life and new hope to others.

You can bet they knew they would sound a little off when they told this story. Who was going to believe them? But it was part of what had formed them, given them the resolve to continue in the work Jesus had for them in that moment and in the years to come. It was their hope that it would bring some sense of that awe and wonder, fear and trembling to the rest of us when we consider Jesus. Jesus had come in the form of a child, helpless and fragile, needy, just as we are, still this moment, and the resurrection, there would be glimpses of the glory, the power, the awesomeness of God, and Jesus as the Son of God.

Today, may be an opportunity to just gaze at the landscape, listen for the breath of God, feel the power of the Holy Spirit. There is always a time for questions and we should question, but this moment is one to ponder, pause, wonder at the one we call our Lord and Saviour. To give thanks that we can question, but we don't need to have all the answers. It is a moment of witness and a time to consider the ways that God has shown Godself to you in your life and in the lives of those you know.

Then, like the Jesus, Peter, James and John, we come away from that moment to roll up our selves and get back to the work of bringing God's kingdom here on earth through acts of love, kindness, grace, forgiveness, and justice. Unlike the disciples we get to tell anyone and everyone who will listen what we have seen, and heard, and believe about God.

On this day, may you be blessed with awe and wonder. Amen
