### Scripture Reading John 12:20-36

<sup>20</sup>Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. <sup>21</sup>They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." <sup>22</sup>Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. <sup>23</sup>Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. <sup>24</sup>Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. <sup>25</sup>Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. <sup>26</sup>Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. # Message Drawn to God

It has been a long time since I have been in a crowd. I am not a big crowd person anyway, but there are times that being with a large group of people can be exciting and have a lasting impact. Every time I see a large crowd in a video, I find myself recoiling a little, as it is a jarring image in this time of pandemic. It is like watching old movies where everyone smoked and now props of cigarettes, cigars, and pipes seem out of place unless the film is set in a prior decade or two. Now it is so with crowds. Between that and facemasks we will forever be able to pick out shows and movies made in 2020 and 21 and maybe even longer.

The image of crowds also stuck with me as I prepared to write this message. Though no crowd is mentioned in the scripture read today, the scene is set in the paragraphs that come before. A great crowd of Jews had gathered a couple of days prior because they had heard that Jesus had raised his friend Lazarus from the dead. In the crowd, chief

priests were planning to not only to put Jesus to death, but Lazarus too "since it was on account of him that many of the Jews were deserting and were believing in Jesus" (John 12:11).

The next day was the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Again, a big crowd, and yes, the scripture read from John 12 skips over that part, getting a little ahead of itself as next week is when we celebrate Palm Sunday. And the city is overflowing with people who have come to celebrate the Passover Festival, among them Greeks. Not unheard of, as many people, not just Jews, were attracted to the Jewish faith and would be there to learn and commemorate the history of the Hebrew people, even take steps to be adopted into the faith.

For the writer of the Gospel of John, these Greeks, who were among "those who went up to worship at the festival" (Jn 12:20) and who now approached Philip to ask if they could see Jesus, these people represented the world being drawn to Jesus. This is an overarching theme of scripture, God drawing people to himself, desiring to be in relationship with the people God created and loved.

It is not until the Greeks come that Jesus then says, "it is for this reason that I have come to this hour" (Jn 12:27). The hour being his death. Jesus is preparing himself for death, a death that he knows will have him nailed up on a cross, a death in which he says, "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself" (Jn 12:32). The purpose of Jesus coming as a baby, growing up, his ministry with all its teaching and healing, his death, resurrection, and ascension, are all about being in relationship with people...you and me and every other person walking the face of the earth, in all times, and in all places.

Jesus talks about driving out the ruler of this world, because what rules us internally and externally has the power to cause us to die. It may be a hundred deaths of regret and shame, pain and sorrow, or our physical death. It may be the death that comes from systems of oppression including racism, gender violence, agism, and domination through an economic system that rewards those that have and takes even more from those who have little. Jesus drives out death, death that comes internally or externally from injustice or hate.

Jesus' death is and will be for the sake of the world and to establish the God kingdom that will rule the world. This work of establishing a kingdom for God will continue until Jesus' return. Jesus was the grain of wheat that fell to the earth and died, but in that death, Jesus was able to bear much fruit. We are the fruit of that promise. In this inbetween time of Jesus ascension and coming again, each of us as individuals and collectively as the people of God, are the light of the world that draws people to Jesus...to God. Those of us who have come to believe in the power of Jesus, who daily desire to be in relationship with God and are in relationship with God are the ones who can bring seeds of hope to an aching world.

As people who know and read scripture, we have the words of Jesus, words that have the power to heal. Acting as agents of God's love in the world, we have the ability to give voice to the disadvantaged, giving them opportunity to thrive. Jesus is the light of the world, but each of us can shine with God's love and power to transform ourselves, be companions for those who are transforming, and extend that transforming love and power into every place and space where darkness, places where God's love is absent, can also become places of hope, love, and grace.

This is a high calling, but also one that is attainable. When we experience God's hope, love, and grace, when we trust it, even it if is a little or maybe a lot scary, we can live into it. It goes back to the words of verses 25 and 26 "Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor."

Jesus doesn't mean here to hate your life, as if it has no value, rather its value comes in being in relationship with God, in living in a way that serves God and others. Remembering that the one calling us to serve is the Jesus who got down on his knees and washed the feet of others, healed the sick, and fed the hungry.

It may be helpful to hear words credited to St. Ignatius of Loyola, often referred to as a prayer of generosity.

Jesus, teach me to be generous, to serve you as you deserve: to give without counting the cost, to fight needless of the wounds, to work and not seek for rest, to toil and not seek for reward, save the reward of knowing I am doing your will.

We are called to serve Jesus, to be light, hope, and grace in the world. It is as simple and as difficult as that, but living in this way brings meaning and purpose to our lives and to the lives of those we interact with.

A word of caution; living in this way will transform you, you will never be the same, you will be changed, challenged, touched, fearful, amazed, and always on an adventure. You will also know joy, hope, and love through your ever deepening relationship with God who goes with you, prepares your way, and never leave you orphaned.

This is life and having life in abundance. In Christ, with Christ, and through Christ. Amen.
