Introit

Welcome

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

It has often been the case that the Sunday before Easter has a focus either on the Triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem, which is how we have come to name this Sunday Palm Sunday, or the focus is on the events between that entry and the cross, a narrative known as the Passion.

Today I invite you to listen to the whole story, from the entry of Jesus to Jerusalem to the moment the stone was rolled against the door of the tomb after Jesus' crucifixion. So often we jump from the Hallelujahs of Palm Sunday to the “He is risen of Easter Sunday” forgetting that there was a week of activity in between. We also prefer the joy and celebration from the grief, sorrow, and pain of the betrayal of friends and the horror of the cross.

So, I invite you into the story. There is so much to pay attention to. Power and politics, prestige and privilege, intrigue and conspiracies, all threads in the story. You may find yourself drawn to particular characters or scenes. If so, stop and pay attention to that. What is it about that moment, certain words, or other piece that has moved you? What emotions are you feeling and thoughts that may lead you into a deeper understanding? Hear now the journey to the cross, and may God add a blessing to the reading of the Word.

Scripture Reading John 12:12-19

¹²The next day the great crowd that had come to the festival heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. ¹³So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, shouting, “Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord—the King of Israel!” ¹⁴Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it; as it is written: ¹⁵“Do not be afraid, daughter of Zion. Look, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey’s colt!” ¹⁶His disciples did not understand these things at first; but when Jesus was glorified, then they remembered that these things had been written of him and had been done to him. ¹⁷So the crowd that had been with him when he called Lazarus out of the tomb and raised him from the dead continued to testify. ¹⁸It was also because they heard that he had performed this sign that the crowd went to meet him. ¹⁹The Pharisees then said to one another, “You see, you can do nothing. Look, the world has gone after him!”

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Prayer of Adoration and Confession

Illuminating God whose story and presence has accompanied your people in all times and places, we come before you today to hear words of scripture, sing songs of praise, and to pray. We give thanks for this day of celebration but know that because of our sinfulness and that of the world, the story of Jesus’ suffering and death still has meaning and purpose for our lives, redeeming our relationships with one another, with God, and with ourselves. Forgive that which keeps us from living full and abundant lives in, for, and with you.

As we listen to the scriptures, open our hearts and minds that we can hear the story with new understanding, meaning, and purpose. Through Christ our Lord who taught us to pray...

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Lord’s Prayer

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.

Assurance of Pardon

St. John records Jesus' words: I do not call you servants any longer, but I have called you friends. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. Dear friends, Christ has laid down his life for us and invites us to love one another as he has loved us. Rejoice in his redeeming love and share it with each other day by day.

Glory be to God, and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit. Amen.
