Message As I have loved you

This Sunday is Mother's Day. It is a day that we celebrate the love of our mothers. It is a generational love. I think of my own mom, giving thanks for her presence in my life. She was not a perfect person, but I knew that she loved me, and I often grieve, not her death, as I trust that she is in the loving arms of God, but rather I grieve the loss of her presence in my life. Phones calls between us are no longer part of my week. It is also a day that I consider my own life as a mother, knowing that I too have been far from perfect, but trusting that my children know how much and how deeply I love them.

Not everyone has had the opportunity for such a relationship with the one who brought them into the world. Moms can be as troubled and broken as anyone, so may not have the capacity for the love that we like to celebrate with Hallmark cards and breakfast in bed. When we have not experienced deep and abiding love from a parent, and even when we have, it can be difficult to get our minds wrapped around the love that Jesus is talking about in this scripture reading from the Gospel of John.

John 15:9-17 could use a little context. First of all, this follows from the scripture about Jesus being the true vine as he spoke about those who abide in the vine bearing much fruit. If you want to know more about that check out the service from May 2nd. The whole passage is also part of what is known as Jesus' farewell discourse. Jesus knows that his life is nearing its end and so is imparting to the disciples the last of his teachings, but also giving reassurance and promises. This commandment to love also comes between Jesus' foretelling of his betrayal by Judas, and when Peter denies that he knows Jesus, after Jesus was arrested.

So, if you are inclined to remove this passage from its context you miss out on the true nature of this sacrificial love set within the relationship of love between God the Father and the Son, and understood through the lens of friendship. This is not a fluffy, goodvibes, or euphoric love. This is love set in the messiness of life. True love for another person, even someone that you have pledged your life too, is not going to be easy and without struggle. In fact, true love will test your limits and boundaries.

Still, it is always important for me to say and for you to hear that if you are in an abusive relationship, that is not love, it is messy, but it is not love. It is power and domination over another. Sacrificial love, which looks to the well being, health and wholeness of another, well, that is getting closer to what Jesus is sharing here.

There is a gentleman here in Thunder Bay that I do not know personally, but he has given his life to the well being of children and to families of those who are underprivileged, most of whom are indigenous. Peter Panetta runs the Underground Gym. Our congregation makes a yearly donation toward the work of this place that is a home away from home for at risk youth. He loves sacrificially, giving of time, money,

energy, organizing, and making sure there is food, supplies, love, and joy in the lives of those who come to him. That is his calling, that is his purpose. This has not been without much challenge; in November 2019 a fire made the building unusable and then in April 2020 a break in and theft of 90% of the gym's property certainly left a painful hole.

Yet, Peter never gave up hope that he could once again serve the children and youth, and even with Covid the Gym has opened in a new location as people stepped up donating to the cost of the building, and still others are generously giving materials, time, talent, and whatever is needed to make this a safe place for youth in great need and at great risk.

Peter is not a perfect person, but he seems to me to be an example of the love that Jesus was talking about when he commanded us to love one another as I have loved you. This does not mean that you or I are to be another Peter and certainly not another Jesus, but each of us is called to love others. It is our task to figure out how that will be lived out in our own lives.

Depending on the season of your life, loving another as Jesus loved may mean being creative, caring, and sacrificing for your partner who is struggling with mental, physical, and/or emotional challenges. Some people do it as part of their vocation as teachers, health care professionals, lawyers, small business owners and many other professions that directly touch the lives of others who do not have means. Many of us need to be more aware of the lives and challenges that others face giving from our resources of finances, personality, talents, or interests that would serve to lift others up, giving them hope, love, and a place of safety whether physically or emotionally.

This is a conversation in which actions truly do speak louder than words and it comes from Jesus' own example. When Jesus says, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" he not only says it but does it. He speaks boldly and openly to all and anyone, and he lives what he says, but it all comes out of a place of love. When we preach that God is love, it comes out of the truth of Jesus being who he says he is and doing what he teaches others to do.

One might wonder where the freedom to love comes in all the talk of commandments, but it the freedom to love because of the love the Father has for Jesus, Jesus has for us, and Jesus desires for us. Once we can get our minds around the words and actions of Jesus for us, we can begin to see how the commandment to love one another as I have loved you might be lived out in our own lives.

Jesus loves us as friends, making known to us, trusting us, with everything that he heard from his Father. Being in relationship with the disciples and now us is something that Jesus chooses because of love. The hope is that we will love one another and that our love that flows, from God and Jesus, will flow to others.

I recall from my interview before being offered and then accepting the position of minister at St. Andrew's I said, "If you are looking for someone to get butts in the pew, you have the wrong person, but if by our love butts land in the pew, then I am all in." I still stand by that statement as I struggle myself to love as Jesus loved.

This is no easy way to do this because it is sacrificial love, it is meant to be costly, and that cost is usually more than money and often has nothing to do with money. It is a personal cost, just like Jesus gave of himself, we give of ourselves. We will not do it perfectly and it may often be messy. Having said that, we are not someone else's saviour. Only Jesus is saviour, but we are called to live lives that touch others with hope, grace, acceptance, assurance, and service. It is in this way that we bear fruit, fruit that will last, and because of that we will experience the joy of Jesus in us and our joy will be complete.

This happens, in Christ, with Christ and only through Christ. Amen.
