Are there errors in the Bible?

This question usually assumes that what we mean by "errors" are such things as the mistakes we might find today in reading a book on history or science. "Error" is that which is not consistent with what we know by different means of verification or established laws of science. This definition of error is very clear-cut.

Some Christians believe the Bible cannot properly be called the "Word of God" if it could be proved that even one historical or scientific error is found within its pages. If God is perfect, they argue, then God's "word" must also be perfect—a single error casts doubt on the truth of God. A refinement is to say that there can be no such "errors" in the biblical writings (autographa). original This qualification is necessary because the Bible as we have it now is a synthesis of a number of manuscripts or copies of texts. So it is possible that some scribe could have made an error in copying a word, and an "error" could creep into a biblical text. Some Presbyterians have held to this theory, called "biblical inerrancy."

Yet this is not the only way to view this question. Other Presbyterians, who are equally committed to affirming the Bible's authority, believe that this understanding of "error" is not an appropriate way to approach the Bible. The Scriptures are ancient documents, written by people who were not concerned with the same kinds of issues of "science: or "history" that we are today. We should not expect the same standards for "accuracy" from them if this was not their goal. Biblically, one is in "error" when one deviates or goes "astray" from God's truth as an expression of God's will (1 Cor. 12:2; Titus 3:3; 1 Pet. 2:25). This is "error" of the most serious kind. No Presbyterian believes this kind of "error" is in the Bible. The Bible is trustworthy and reliable as the source for our knowledge of God and how God wants us to live in this sense the Bible is "infallible." Even if there were historical or scientific errors in the Bible, this would not diminish what the Bible is: God's divinely revealed source for knowing who God is and what God has done, especially in giving us salvation in Jesus Christ.

So the answer to our question relates to how we

define "error." It also relates to our view of the nature of Scripture and how God works through the Bible to be revealed to us.

NEW BEGINNINGS

St. Andrew's has been accepted into the New Beginnings program of the PCC. This is the breakdown of program that the church will be participating in. We ask that you hold our ministry, leadership, and congregation in prayer as we prepare for this time of discernment, hope, and discovery.

- 1. **Assessment** of the current ministry of the church, celebration of the way God has been present and is present with the congregation and a realistic identification of potential future steps.
- 2. **Workshops** to help the congregation understand the changes in spiritual practices in this new era and why many elements of current ministry structures no longer work.
- 3. **House Meetings** to open yourselves to new ways of thinking about mission and to make a bold decision for the future.
- 4. **Coaching** to help implement your future story." We will be assigned a specially trained assessor and coach to guide us through the process. All those trained to be assessors and coaches are ministers of the PCC.
