December is a month to share good news!

In February 2022 the Facilities and Finance team learned about the Ontario Grant to Support Anti-Hate Security Measures for Faith-Based and Cultural Organizations. The grant was an attestationbased grant, meaning we had to show proof that work was done to use the grant. The grant provided funds to faith-based and cultural organizations to increase safety and security measures. The main requirement was that eligible applicants must host regular gatherings (i.e., at least once a month) of religious, spiritual or cultural significance. Hosting these gatherings were to be a primary activity of the applicant.

The team went into high gear and put together an application as the deadline was March 3rd. Security of the back door at the end of the main hallway was the subject of the grant. The grant was approved for \$7,500! Facilities and Finance contracted Ken Yanishewski to do the work and in the last few weeks Ken has removed the door and moved it out about three feet, which lined the door up with the existing outside wall. This was done to remove the alcove and step on the outside. This area was being frequented as hide-away to defecate and use drugs. The doors and frame were made of wood and there had once been a fire at the back step. As well, just prior to the removal of the old doors an attempt had been made to break in. The hinges were rusting and the wood frame was rotting. One hinge was no longer even holding.

We now have metal doors and frame, the security system is active, new flooring installed, along with a dusk to dawn lighting, on the outside of the building, illuminating the back alley. The electrical was completed by Gilbert Electric. The doors were painted by Kerry Pawlick. There are a few cosmetic finishings to be completed, but the door is there, safe and functional!
