Blessings on this Mother's Day. It is a wonderful day to be able to celebrate mothers and motherhood, and to bring some pampering and joy. Thinking about this day I became curious as to how we got to this place of celebrating mothers in this way and so did a guick internet search and found the following... "The movement for Mother's Day was significantly influenced by Ann Reeves Jarvis, who organized 'Mothers' Day Work Clubs' in the mid-1800s in West Virginia. These clubs aimed to improve health and sanitation in the community and foster reconciliation during the Civil War by bringing together mothers from both Union and Confederate sides. After Ann passed away in 1905, her daughter, Anna dedicated herself to creating a national holiday to honour mothers. She held the first official Mother's Day celebration on May 10, 1908, in Grafton, West Virginia, at her mother's church. This event was a memorial service for her mother and aimed to recognize the sacrifices mothers make for their children. Anna Jarvis's campaign dained momentum, and by 1914, President Woodrow Wilson officially declared Mother's Day a national holiday, to be celebrated on the second Sunday in May."

I think it is helpful to have this background as Mother's Day can also be a very difficult one for people. There are many who have had difficult relationships with their mothers. There are those who have wanted to be mothers and that just didn't come to pass. For some mothers there has been estrangement from children. And then there is the grief of those whose children have died before them, not to mention the grief of those whose mothers have passed away. In an age when the holiday is so commercialized it's good to look at the roots of the celebration: a day for appreciating mothers and their contributions to society. I love the way it speaks to what it means to be community. This is what motherhood has brought to our world, a sense that community matters, that people matter. Not all mums get that, or are great mothers, but this is truly what motherhood is about. Raising up children who know what it means to love and cherish their own children, and how to be productive members of society; people who contribute to the well-being of individuals and community. In this way we can honour motherhood through our own actions, and show that community matters, people matter, and we can be the ones who let others know their value. Now that is something to celebrate!

MISSION MOMENT

"I could not get medical help in time because we did not have enough money," says 65-year-old Rugaiva, who lives in Afghanistan, Rugaiva's life took a challenging turn ten years ago when she fell on ice, resulting in partial paralysis. Despite her impairment, she helps care for her youngest son, who has a hand impairment, two daughtersin-law, and two young grandchildren while her two oldest sons work as porters in Kabul, struggling to earn enough. Before her injury, Rugaiya was known for her skill in weaving and was able to earn a decent income. Now unable to weave, she faces significant financial hardship, made worse by the political and economic situation in the country. Relief came when Rugaiya received cash assistance through a PWS&D-supported project. She purchased essentials like oil, pulses, flour, rice and salt, meeting her family's food needs during the harsh winter.
